LIFE FORGIVEN—GRACE THAT KEEPS US TOGETHER

INTRODUCTION: Remember yesterday's muffin mix and that connecting rod? Crisco and Pennzoil 5W-30 were our only hope when things get too close and hot. All this is good for keeping us apart. But what holds us together?

Without something holding us together, we've got nothing but dusty flour and muffin mix. Or, we're dropping shims on the floor.

So what makes our Life Together?

WHAT HOLDS US APART HOLDS US TOGETHER: CONSIDER THESE VERSES

Bone on Bone Sounds Painful: 1 Corinthians 12:12-15, 20-22, 24b-27: For even as the body is one and yet has many members, and all the members of the body, though they are many, are one body, so also is Christ. ¹³ For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, whether slaves or free, and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. ¹⁴ For the body is not one member, but many. ¹⁵ If the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I am not a part of the body," it is not for this reason any the less a part of the body. ²⁰ But now there are many members, but one body. ²¹ And the eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you"; or again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." ²² On the contrary, it is much truer that the members of the body which seem to be weaker are necessary; ... But God has so composed the body, giving more abundant honor to that member which lacked, ²⁵ that there should be no division in the body, but that the members should have the same care for one another. ²⁶ And if one member suffers, all the members suffer with it; if one member is honored, all the members rejoice with it. ²⁷ Now you are Christ's body, and individually members of it

That Which Brings Us Closer: Philippians 2:1-5: If therefore there is any encouragement in Christ, if there is any consolation of love, if there is any fellowship of the Spirit, if any affection and compassion, ² make my joy complete by being of the same mind, maintaining the same love, united in spirit, intent on one purpose. ³ Do nothing from selfishness or empty conceit, but with humility of mind let each of you regard one another as more important than himself; ⁴ do not merely look out for your own personal interests, but also for the interests of others. ⁵ Have this attitude in yourselves which was also in Christ Jesus,

We All See the Same Picture On The Box--A Common Purpose: Philippians 1:3-6: I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, ⁴ always offering prayer with joy in my every prayer for you all, ⁵ in view of your participation in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶ For I am confident of this very thing, that He who began a good work in you will perfect it until the day of Christ Jesus

This Defies Gravity: 1 Corinthians 10:16-17: Is not the cup of blessing which we bless a sharing in the blood of Christ? Is not the bread which we break a sharing in the body of Christ? ¹⁷ Since there is one bread, we who are many are one body; for we all partake of the one bread.

THE EFFECT OF GRACE ON OUR LIFE TOGETHER:

Meeting Charlie in Hatley!— Ephesians 4:4-6: There is one body and one Spirit, just as also you were called in one hope of your calling; ⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism, ⁶ one God and Father of all who is over all and through all and in all.

Those Clannish Finns—Acts 15:5-11: But certain ones of the sect of the Pharisees who had believed, stood up, saying, "It is necessary to circumcise them, and to direct them to observe the Law of Moses." ⁶ And the apostles and the elders came together to look into this matter. ⁷ And after there had been much debate, Peter stood up and said to them, "Brethren, you know that in the early days God made a choice among you, that by my mouth the Gentiles should hear the word of the gospel and believe. ⁸ "And God, who knows the heart, bore witness to them, giving them the Holy Spirit, just as He also did to us; ⁹ and He made no distinction between us and them, cleansing their hearts by faith. ¹⁰ "Now therefore why do you put God to the test by placing upon the neck of the disciples a yoke which neither our fathers nor we have been able to bear? ¹¹ "But we believe that we are saved through the grace of the Lord Jesus, in the same way as they also are."

- 32 • Mr. Herman Strozier, District Business Manager, noted that the Camp is currently listed as a
33 \$938,000 net asset on the District's financial statements, if transferred it would show up as a loss on the
34 SWD books.
35 • Furthermore, an appraisal has just been received in the amount of \$1.95 million, therefore in
36 essence it will result in a \$1.95 million loss.
37 • Is there a requirement that the SWD BOD sell to a 501(c)3, and RSO if it sells the property to
38 another entity, other than the newly organized Camp LuWiSoMo? And if so, why? It would not restrict
39 it was an encouragement for the Camp to do so. If they fail to do so, they would not be excluded from
40 consideration of purchase.
41 • Camps need to be able to act and respond quickly without needing approval from another Board.
42 • What about RSO status? How difficult would this be to attain under the current situation in
43 Synod? The method of evaluation of RSOs is underway. There is a review going on but the amount of
44 time necessary is not known
45 • What will be the impact of the \$2 million loss? It could possibly be substantial.
